

FOREWORD

There have always been men (and possibly women) who have yearned to know what lay beyond the horizon. Norse explorer Erik Thorvaldsson and Spanish and Portuguese explorers Christopher Columbus, Ferdinand Magellan, and Hernán Cortés were among the earliest to have a major impact on the land that would become known as the "Americas."
